





#### State of the Birds: 2018

- Critical Role of State Agencies in Bird Conservation
  - Efforts by Agencies to Reverse Declines Insufficient; funding strapped
  - Urgency and magnitude of the challenge
  - Economic cost of species conservation backlog (ESA)
- Recovering America's Wildlife Act (Blue Ribbon Panel)
  - Increase capacity of state wildlife agencies
  - Relevancy changing society, broader constituencies



## State of the Birds 2018: The Challenge



- Net Population Loss of 2 billion native landbirds since 1970
- Net Loss in ALL habitats, including generalists; largest in Grasslands
- 50% of Loss —10 most abundant and widespread species
- Shorebirds declined by 35%
- Loss across 258 SGCN species, listed in at least one state = 1.6 billion birds

#### State of the Birds 2018: The Solution



- Recovering America's Wildlife Act
- Sustainable source of conservation funding for states (\$1.7 billion/yr)
- No cost to taxpayers
- States have SWAPs ready for 12,000 SGCN species, 800 birds
- Give states resources to implement plans with proactive, voluntary conservation projects

#### State of the Birds 2018: The Benefits



- Keep species off ESA lists
- Sustainable funding for state-led conservation efforts
- Regulatory certainty for industry
- Economic benefits to states from wildlife (bird) activities (\$182 million in output from current SWG)
- Partnerships engage state capacity –
  Joint Ventures, Flyway Councils, Farm
  Bill biologists, etc.

  - AFWA BCC support and recommendation to Directors; Flyway councils
- Potential 1 page insert for all states?
- Release report in fall 2018 (October-December); or early 2019?
- Focus on state agencies, or advocate for RAWA?
