NABCI 2017-2021 Strategic Plan Goal 1, Subgoal 1: Support, develop, integrate, and promote priorities of regional, national, and international bird conservation partnerships;

Purpose: The big-picture initiatives discussed throughout this meeting all support a campaign to recover declining populations of birds. This presentation will provide a brief overview of progress under NABCl's "5 Game Changing Paradigms," including Road to Recovery science. This will set the stage for the subsequent presentations, which explore in more depth ways to build unprecedented coalitions and support human dimension science for bird population recovery.

The Role of Social Science in the 5 Game Changing Paradigms

Jessica Barnes, NABCI/Virginia Tech, Tammy VerCauteren, Bird Conservancy of the Rockies NABCI 2017-2021 Strategic Plan Goal 1, Subgoal 1: Promote and advance the use of ecological and social science in design and evaluation of bird conservation practices; Enable bird conservation partners to integrate human dimensions science and tools into bird conservation efforts.

Purpose: From effectively building a coalition, to advancing science to address bird declines, to developing messaging that resonates with different constituencies, every aspect of the 5 Game Changing Paradigms requires social science integrated with biological science to achieve success. The Human Dimensions Subcommittee of NABCI will propose how the Five Game Changing Paradigms can be adapted to be more inclusive of social science, allowing NABCI to articulate to partners the role social science can offer and providing a tool to recruit social scientists to the coalition. This session will enable partners to give feedback on social science needs associated with each paradigm as we modify our "business as usual" approach to reverse bird population declines.

Proposed Outcomes: NABCI partners weigh in to make the 5 Game Changing Paradigms inclusive of human dimensions, clearly articulating high priority social science needs that will help remove barriers to bird population recovery and human engagement in bird conservation.
